Holidays; Standard of Time

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187.010

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187.010 Legal holidays; acts deferred to next business day. (1) The following days are legal holidays in this state:

- (a) Each Sunday.
- (b) New Year's Day on January 1.
- (c) Memorial Day on the last Monday in May.
- (d) Independence Day on July 4.
- (e) Labor Day on the first Monday in September.
- (f) Veterans Day on November 11.
- (g) Thanksgiving Day on the fourth Thursday in November.
- (h) Christmas Day on December 25.

If any of such holidays, other than Sunday, at any time fall on Sunday, the succeeding Monday shall be a holiday in that year. If any of such holidays, other than Sunday, at any time fall on a Saturday, the preceding Friday shall be a holiday in that year.

(2) Any act authorized, required or permitted to be performed on a holiday as designated in this section may be performed on the next succeeding business day; and no liability or loss of rights of any kind shall result from such delay.

187.020 Additional legal holidays. In addition to those specified in ORS 187.010, the following days are legal holidays in this state:

- (1) Lincoln's Birthday on the first Monday in February.
- (2) Washington's Birthday on the third Monday in February.
- (3) Every day appointed by the President of the United States or by the Governor as a holiday.

If any of such holidays at any time fall on Sunday, the succeeding Monday shall be a holiday in that year. If any of such holidays at any time fall on Saturday, the preceding Friday shall be a holiday in that year.

187.025 Days of commemoration. The following days shall be days of commemoration but not legal holidays and shall be suitably observed in schools:

- (1) Admission of Oregon into the Union on February 14.
- (2) Columbus Day on October 12.

187.030 Banks closing on Saturdays and holidays; negotiable instruments

payable on holidays, effect on time of payment. (1) Any bank which elects to close on Saturdays under any Act permitting such closure shall not remain closed on any holiday enumerated in ORS 187.020 when such holiday occurs on Friday or the observance of which occurs on Monday.

(2) Any bank, which term, for the purposes of this section, includes any state bank, national bank, federal reserve bank, trust company, safe deposit company, mutual savings bank and savings and loan association, doing business in this state, may, at its sole option, remain open for business on any holiday as designated in ORS 187.020; but any act authorized, required or permitted to be performed at or by or with respect to any bank, as herein defined, may be performed on the next succeeding business day, and no liability or loss of rights of any kind shall result from such performance of business on such holiday.

(3) Negotiable instruments falling due on any holiday designated in ORS 187.010 or 187.020 shall be due and payable on the next succeeding business day.

187.110 Standard of time. (1) The standard of time for the State of Oregon shall be the United States standard of time as established by the Congress of the United States for any particular area of the state under the Act of March 19, 1918, (15 U.S.C. 261) except that from 2 a.m. on the last Sunday in April until 2 a.m. on the last Sunday in October the standard of time for any area of this state shall be one hour in advance of the standard established for that particular area by the Congress of the United States under the Act of March 19, 1918.

(2) No department of the state government and no county, city or other political subdivision shall employ any other time or adopt any statute, ordinance or order providing for the use of any other standard of time.

Sec. 1. A temporary state commission to be known as American Revolution Bicentennial Commission of Oregon is created in order to provide for appropriate observances, ceremonies and other activities to commemorate the 200th anniversary of the American Revolution.

Sec. 2. The commission shall consist of nine citizens of the state for terms of two years, appointed by and responsible to the Governor. The Governor shall appoint from its membership the chairman and vice chairman of the commission. When the term of a member expires, the Governor shall appoint a successor. Members may be reappointed. Vacancies in the

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membership and in the offices of chairman and vice chairman shall be filled by the Governor.

Sec. 3. The members of the commission shall receive no compensation for their services.

Sec. 4. The commission, at its pleasure, may employ, fix their compensation, and remove such personnel as it may deem necessary for the performance of its functions.

Sec. 5. The commission is directed to prepare and implement the program for this state's participation in commemorating the 200th anniversary of the American Revolution, cooperating with and giving due consideration to similar programs advanced by any federal, state, municipal, civic, patriotic, military, veterans or historical bodies.

Sec. 6. The commission may meet and participate in bicentennial observances and ceremonies within or without the state and may hold public meetings.

Sec. 7. The commission may solicit, receive and expend contributions in furtherance of its objectives. All moneys received by the commission by gifts or otherwise shall be deposited in the General Fund in the State Treasury to the credit of the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission Account, which account is hereby created. Such moneys are continuously appropriated to the commission and shall be expended in carrying out its functions and duties in the manner and in such amounts as may be authorized by the Legislative Assembly or the Emergency Board if the legislature is not in session. Any balance in that account remaining

on July 1, 1977, shall be transferred to the General Fund, to be available for general governmental expenditures.

Sec. 8. The commission, with the consent of the Governor, may request from any agency of state government such facilities, assistance and data as may reasonably be necessary or desirable properly to carry out its powers and duties as stated in section 5 of this Act.

Sec. 9. Notwithstanding any other provisions of law, no officer or employe of the state or of any political subdivision thereof shall be deemed to have forfeited or shall forfeit his office or employment by reason of his acceptance of membership on the commission.

Sec. 10. The commission and its officers and employes are not subject to the State Merit System Law and they are not a "state agency," "agency" or "state officer" within the meaning of those terms as defined in ORS 279.710, 282.050, 291.002 or 292.210, for the purposes of those sections and sections directly related thereto.

Sec. 11. The commission shall submit an annual report to the Governor and the Legislative Assembly. The commission shall submit such other interim report or reports to the Governor and the legislature as he may require, and a final report not later than July 1, 1977, upon which date the commission shall terminate.

Sec. 12. This Act is repealed July 1, 1977.
