Credit Unions

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FORMATION

723.002 Short title; definitions. (1) ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992 shall be known and may be cited as the "Oregon Credit Union Act."

(2) As used in ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992 "superintendent" means the Superintendent of Banks.

(3) As used in ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992, unless the context requires otherwise, "capital" means shares, deposit accounts, regular reserve and undivided earnings.

723.006 "Credit union" defined. A credit union is a cooperative, nonprofit association, incorporated under the laws of this state, for the purposes of encouraging thrift among its members, creating a source of credit at a fair and reasonable rate of interest and providing an opportunity for its members to use and control their own money in order to improve their economic and social condition.

723.012 Organization procedure. (1) Any seven or more residents of this state (or other appropriate jurisdiction), of legal age, who have a common bond referred to in ORS 723.172 may organize a credit union and become charter members thereof by complying with this section.

(2) The incorporators shall execute in duplicate articles of incorporation and agree to the terms thereof, which articles shall state:

(a) The name, which shall include the words "credit union" and which shall not be the same as that of any other existing credit union in this state, and the location where the proposed credit union is to have its principal place of business.

(b) The term of its existence, which may be perpetual.

(c) The par value of the shares of the credit union, which shall be in \$5 multiples, of not less than \$5, nor more than \$25.

(d) The full name, residence and post-office address of each of the incorporators and the value of shares subscribed to by each, which shall not be less than \$5.

(e) The number of its directors, which shall not be less than five, and the names of the incorporators who shall be its directors

until the first annual meeting of shareholders.

(f) The number of the members of the supervisory committee, which shall not be less than three, and the name, residence and post-office address of the persons who are to serve as members until the first meeting of directors.

(g) That the credit union may exercise such incidental powers as are necessary or requisite to enable it to carry on effectively the business for which it is incorporated, and those powers which are inherent in the credit union as a legal entity.

(3) The incorporators shall prepare and adopt bylaws for the general government of the credit union, consistent with ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992, and execute the same in duplicate.

(4) The incorporators shall forward the articles of incorporation and the bylaws to the superintendent, together with a filing fee of \$150. The superintendent shall issue a certificate of approval if the articles and the bylaws are in conformity with ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992 and he is satisfied that the proposed field of operation is favorable to the success of such credit union and that the standing of the proposed organizers is such as to give assurance that its affairs will be properly administered. He shall return a copy of the bylaws and the articles to the applicants or their representatives, which shall be preserved in the permanent files of the credit union. The application shall be acted upon within 60 days.

(5) The subscribers for a credit union charter shall not transact any business until formal approval of the articles and bylaws has been received.

723.016 Form of articles and bylaws. In order to simplify the organization of credit unions, the superintendent shall cause to be prepared a form of articles of incorporation and a form of bylaws, consistent with ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992, which may be used by credit union incorporators for their guidance. Such articles of incorporation and bylaws shall be available without charge to persons desiring to organize a credit union.

723.022 Amendments. (1) The articles of incorporation or the bylaws may be amended as provided in the bylaws. Amend-

ments to the articles of incorporation or by-laws shall be submitted, together with a fee of \$5, to the superintendent, who shall approve or disapprove the amendments within 60 days.

(2) Amendments shall become effective upon approval in writing by the superintendent.

723.026 Use of name exclusive. With the exception of a credit union organized under the provisions of ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992 or of any other credit union act, or an association of credit unions or a recognized chapter thereof, any person, corporation, partnership or association using a name or title containing the words "credit union" or any derivation thereof or representing themselves in their advertising or otherwise as conducting business as a credit union shall be fined not more than \$500 or imprisoned not more than one year, or both, and may be permanently enjoined from using such words in its name

723.032 Office facilities. (1) Any credit union may make a written application to the superintendent for leave to establish a branch or branches in any county in this state. The application shall state the reasons for the establishment of a branch or branches and shall be signed and acknowledged by a majority of its board of directors. The superintendent shall determine whether or not the establishment of a branch or branches is advisable or justified and whether the public convenience and advantage will be promoted, and shall, at his discretion, approve or disapprove the establishment of a branch or branches. If the superintendent grants his certificate authorizing the establishment of a branch or branches, as provided by law, the credit union may, upon or after the day specified, establish such a branch or branches.

(2) A credit union may change its place of business within this state upon written notice to, and approval by, the superintendent.

(3) A credit union may share office space with one or more credit unions and contract with any person or corporation to provide facilities or personnel.

723.036 Fiscal year. The fiscal year of

each credit union shall end on the last day of December.

723.042 Out-of-state credit unions. A credit union organized and duly qualified as a credit union in another state may conduct business as a credit union in this state provided:

(1) Such credit union is organized under a credit union law substantially similar to ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992;

(2) The interest rate of such credit union on loans made to members in this state does not exceed the maximum interest rate permitted by ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992;

(3) A credit union organized and doing business under the laws of this state is permitted to do business in such other state under conditions substantially similar to those in ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992;

(4) The superintendent approves an application filed by the credit union, which application shall include an agreement to comply with all rules and regulations prescribed by the superintendent;

(5) Such credit union agrees to submit an annual report of examination from the supervising agency of the state in which it is chartered; and

(6) Such credit union agrees to authorize the examination of its parent credit union by the superintendent and to pay the reasonable costs and fee of such examination according to the fee schedule set forth in subsections (3) to (5) of ORS 723.112.

SUPERVISION AND REGULATION

723.102 Credit union section. (1) The Director of Commerce shall create a credit union section under the supervision of the superintendent.

(2) The superintendent shall administer the laws of this state relating to credit unions. He may appoint or employ such special assistants, deputies, examiners or other employes as are necessary for the purpose of administering or enforcing ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992; provided, however, the superintendent, his deputies, examiners and other employes of the credit union section, and the Administrator of the National Credit Union Administration, his deputies, examiners and other employes of the National Credit Union Administration, are prohibited from borrowing from credit unions subject to their supervision.

(3) The superintendent may prescribe rules and regulations for the administration of ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992.

(4) The superintendent shall from time to time issue rules and regulations prescribing the minimum amount of surety bond coverage and casualty, liability and fire insurance required of credit unions in relation to their assets or to the money and other personal property involved, or their exposure to risk.

723.106 Reports. (1) Credit unions shall report to the superintendent annually on or before January 31 of each year on forms supplied by him for that purpose. Additional reports may be required.

(2) A fine of \$5 for each day a report is in arrears shall be levied against the offending credit union unless it is excused for cause by the superintendent.

723.112 Examinations. (1) The superintendent shall annually examine or cause to be examined each credit union. Each credit union and all of its officers and agents shall be required to give to representatives of the superintendent full access to all books, papers, securities, records and other sources of information under their control; and for the purpose of such examination said representatives may subpoena witnesses, administer oaths, compel the giving of testimony and require the submission of documents.

(2) A report of such examination shall be forwarded to the executive officer of each credit union within 60 days after completion. Said report shall contain comments relative to the management of the affairs of the

credit union and also as to the general condition of its assets. Within 45 days after the receipt of such report, the directors and committeemen shall meet to consider matters contained in the report and shall report in writing to the superintendent as to the manner in which the credit union shall comply with the superintendent's recommendations.

(3) To defray the costs of supervision and examination, every credit union shall pay to the superintendent, when each examination is made, a fee based on the total assets of the credit union at the time of such examination according to the following schedule:

(b) In addition thereto, the credit union shall pay an examination fee at the same time of an amount equal to one-tenth of one percent of its total assets not in excess of \$500,000, plus one twenty-fifth of one percent of assets in excess of \$500,000 but not exceeding \$5 million, plus one-fiftieth of one percent of assets in excess of \$5 million.

(c) In addition thereto, the credit union shall pay a branch fee based on the actual cost of each branch examination, or the sum of \$25, whichever is larger.

(4) The superintendent may, as it may appear to him advisable, reduce the fees to be collected for supervision and examination of credit unions.

(5) Whenever any extra attention is devoted to the affairs of a credit union by the superintendent, as may be considered by him to be necessary or expedient or as may be requested by the credit union, the fee for such extra service shall be the actual cost thereof.

723.116 Records. (1) A credit union shall maintain all books, records, accounting systems and procedures in accordance with such rules as the superintendent from time to time prescribes. In prescribing such rules, the superintendent shall consider the relative size of a credit union and its reasonable capability of compliance.

(2) A credit union shall be liable for destroying records prior to the expiration of the record retention time prescribed by the superintendent.

(3) A photostatic or photographic reproduction of any credit union records shall be admissible as evidence of transactions with the credit union.

723.122 Bond. (1) Each credit union shall obtain and maintain a fidelity bond which includes employe faithful performance to cover any and all acts of its agents, directors, officers, committee members or employes in an amount not less than 100 percent of its assets up to \$2 million. Such bond shall be approved by the superintendent who may require such additional amounts as he deems necessary for credit unions with assets in excess of \$2 million.

(2) All bond claims shall be reported to the superintendent.

POWERS

723.152 General powers. In addition to the powers conferred by the general corporation law a credit union may, subject to the restrictions and limitations contained in ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992 and its bylaws:

(1) Make contracts.

(2) Sue and be sued.

(3) Adopt and use a common seal and alter same.

(4) Acquire, lease, hold and dispose of property, either in whole or in part, necessary or incidental to its operations.

(5) At the discretion of the board of directors, require the payment of an entrance fee or annual membership fee, or both, of any person admitted to membership.

(6) Receive savings from its members in the form of shares, deposit accounts or special-purpose thrift accounts, all as defined in ORS 723.402 to 723.432.

(7) Receive from its members or from another credit union deposit accounts or shares payable on nonnegotiable request.

(8) Lend its funds to its members and credit unions as provided in ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992.

(9) Borrow from any source in accordance with policy established by the board of directors.

(10) Discount and sell any eligible obligations, subject to rules and regulations prescribed by the superintendent.

(11) Sell all or substantially all of its assets or purchase all or substantially all of the assets of another credit union, subject to the approval of the superintendent.

(12) Invest surplus funds as provided in ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992.

(13) Make deposits in legally chartered banks, savings banks, savings and loan associations, trust companies and credit union organizations.

(14) Assess charges to members in accordance with the bylaws for failure to meet promptly their obligations to the credit union.

(15) Hold membership in other credit unions organized under ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992 or other Acts, and in other associations and organizations composed of credit unions.

(16) Declare dividends, pay interest on deposit accounts and pay interest refunds to borrowers as provided in ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992.

(17) Collect, receive and disburse moneys in connection with the sale of travelers' checks, money orders and other money-type instruments, and for such other purposes as may provide benefit or convenience to its members, and charge a reasonable fee for such services.

(18) Perform such tasks and missions as are requested by the Federal Government or this state, or any agency or political subdivision thereof, when approved by the board of directors and not inconsistent with ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992.

(19) Receive deposits from the Federal Government or this state, or any agency or political subdivision thereof, when payable for the accounts of members.

(20) With the approval of the superintendent, one or more credit unions (either federal or state) or with an association of credit unions in this state, may purchase accounting services, participate in a service center, or share quarters and carry on business operations either individually or jointly. To accomplish any of the above-stated acts a credit union may purchase stock of a corporation which provides these activities, with such stock purchase limited to one percent of the credit union's capital.

(21) Make donations or contributions to any civic, charitable or community organization as authorized by the board of directors, subject to such regulations as are prescribed by the superintendent.

(22) Act as a custodian of qualified pension funds of self-employed members if permitted by federal law.

723.156 Adoption of rules comparable to federal law and regulations. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the superintendent may, in accordance with ORS 183.310 to 183.410, make reasonable rules authorizing a credit union to exercise any of the powers conferred upon a federally chartered credit union doing business in this state which is subject to the regulations of the Administrator of the National Credit Union Administration or the successor or successors of him, if the superintendent finds that the exercise of the power:

(1) Serves the public convenience and advantage; and

(2) Equalizes and maintains the quality of competition between state chartered credit unions and federally chartered credit unions.

MEMBERSHIP

723.172 Membership defined. (1) The membership of a credit union shall be limited to and consist of the incorporators to the articles of incorporation and such other persons within the common bond set forth in the bylaws as have been duly admitted members, have paid the required entrance fee or membership fee, or both, have subscribed for one or more shares and have paid the initial instalment thereon, and have complied with such other requirements as the articles of incorporation or bylaws specify.

(2) Credit union membership may include groups having a common employer, and members of the immediate family of such persons.

723.176 Societies; associations. Societies, and partnerships composed of individuals who are eligible to membership, and corporations whose stockholders are composed of such individuals, may be admitted to membership in the same manner and under the same conditions as individuals,

but may not borrow in excess of their shareholdings.

723.182 Other credit unions. Any credit union organized under the laws of this state may permit membership of any other credit union organized under the laws of this state, of any other state or of the United States.

723.186 Members who leave field. Members who leave the field of membership may be permitted to retain their membership in the credit union as a matter of general policy of the board of directors.

723.192 Individual liability; shares; exemption from execution. The members of the credit union shall not be personally or individually liable for the payment of the debts of the credit union. The shares of members of any credit union and all accumulations on such shares shall be exempt from sale on execution and proceedings supplementary thereto to the amount of \$600.

723.196 Meeting of members. (1) The annual meeting and any special meetings of the members of the credit union shall be held at the time, place, and in the manner indicated by the bylaws.

(2) At all such meetings a member shall have but one vote, irrespective of his shareholdings. No member may vote by proxy, but a member may vote by absentee ballot if the bylaws of the credit union so provide.

(3) A society, association, partnership or corporation, having membership in the credit union, may be represented and have its vote cast by one of its members or shareholders, provided such person has been fully authorized by the organization's governing body.

(4) The board of directors may establish a minimum age as a qualification of eligibility to vote at meetings of the members.

723.202 Withdrawal and expulsion of members. A member desiring to withdraw from a credit union shall file a written notice of his intention to withdraw. The board of directors may expel any member who has not carried out his engagements with the credit union, who has been convicted of a criminal offense, who neglects or refuses to comply with the provisions of ORS 317.920,

723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992 or of the articles or bylaws of the credit union, who habitually neglects to pay his debts or who becomes insolvent or bankrupt. However, no member shall be expelled until he has been informed in writing of the charges against him and shall have had reasonable opportunity to be heard. Members of a credit union who withdraw or are expelled shall not be relieved of any liability to the credit union. The amounts paid in on shares or deposited by such members, together with any dividends credited to their shares and any interest which has accrued on their deposits, shall be repaid to them in the order of their withdrawal or expulsion, as funds become available therefor, but the credit union may deduct from such payments any sums due it from such members.

DIRECTION OF AFFAIRS

723.252 Election or appointment of officials. (1) The credit union shall be directed by a board consisting of an odd number of directors, at least five in number, to be elected at the annual members' meeting by and from the members. All members of the board shall hold office for such terms as the bylaws provide.

(2) The board of directors shall appoint a supervisory committee of not less than three members at the organizational meeting and within 30 days following each annual meeting of the members for such terms as the bylaws provide.

(3) The board of directors shall appoint a credit committee consisting of an odd number, not less than three in number, for such terms as the bylaws provide, or said credit committee may be elected at the annual members' meeting by and from the members, or in lieu of a credit committee, a credit manager may be appointed.

(4) The board of directors may appoint alternate directors; credit committee or

supervisory committee members to serve in place of absent officials.

723.256 Record of board and committee members. Within 15 days after election or appointment, a record of the names and addresses of the members of the board, committees and all officers of the credit union shall be filed with the superintendent on forms provided by the superintendent.

723.262 Vacancies. The board of directors shall fill any vacancies occurring in the board until successors elected at the next annual meeting have qualified. The board shall also fill vacancies in the credit and supervisory committees or in the office of credit manager.

723.266 Compensation of officials. No officer, director, or committee member, other than the treasurer, a credit manager, a general manager, or a loan officer may be compensated for his service as such, but providing reasonable life, health, accident and similar insurance protection for a director or committee member shall not be considered compensation. Directors and committee members, while on official business of the credit union, may be reimbursed for necessary expenses incidental to the performance of such business.

723.272 Conflicts of interest. No director, committee member, officer, agent or employe of the credit union shall in any manner, directly or indirectly, participate in the deliberation upon or the determination of any question affecting his pecuniary interest or the pecuniary interest of any corporation, partnership or association, (other than the credit union) in which he is directly or indirectly interested.

723.276 Executive officers. (1) At their organizational meeting and within 30 days following each annual meeting of the members, the directors shall elect an executive officer, who may be designated as chairman of the board or president; a vice chairman of the board or one or more vice presi-

dents; a treasurer; and a secretary. The treasurer and the secretary may be the same individual. The persons so elected shall be the executive officers of the corporation.

(2) The terms of the officers shall be one year, or until their successors are chosen and have duly qualified.

(3) The duties of the officers shall be prescribed in the bylaws.

(4) The board of directors may employ an officer in charge of operations whose title shall be general manager; or, in lieu thereof, the board of directors may designate the treasurer or an assistant treasurer to act as general manager and be in active charge of the affairs of the credit union.

723.282 Authority of directors. The board of directors shall have the general direction of the business affairs, funds and records of the credit union.

723.286 Executive committee. From the persons elected to the board, the board may appoint an executive committee of not less than three directors who may be authorized to act for the board in all respects, subject to such conditions and limitations as are prescribed by the board.

723.292 Meetings of directors. The board of directors and the executive committee shall meet as often as necessary, but one body must meet at least monthly and the other at least quarterly.

723.296 Duties of directors. It shall be the duty of the directors to:

(1) Act upon applications for membership or appoint one or more membership officers to approve applications for membership under such conditions as the board prescribes. A record of a membership officer's approval or denial of membership shall be available to the board of directors for inspection. A person denied membership by a membership officer may appeal the denial to the board.

(2) Purchase a blanket fidelity bond, in accordance with any rules and regulations of the superintendent, to protect the credit union against losses caused by occurrences

covered therein such as fraud, dishonesty, forgery, embezzlement, misappropriation, misapplication or unfaithful performance of duty by a director, officer, employe, member of an official committee, attorney-at-law or other agent.

(3) Determine from time to time the interest rate or rates consistent with ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992, which shall be charged on loans and to authorize interest refunds, if any, to members from income earned and received in proportion to the interest paid by them on such classes of loans and under such conditions as the board prescribes.

(4) Fix from time to time the maximum amount which may be loaned to any one member.

(5) Declare dividends on shares in the manner and form as provided in the bylaws and determine the interest rate or rates which will be paid on deposits.

(6) Limit the number of shares and the amount of deposits which may be owned by a member, such limitations to apply alike to all members.

(7) Have charge of the investment of surplus funds, except that the board of directors may designate an investment committee or any qualified individual to have charge of making investments under controls established by the board of directors.

(8) Authorize the employment of such persons necessary to carry on the business of the credit union, including the credit manager, loan officers and auditing assistants requested by the supervisory committee; and fix the compensation, if any, of the treasurer, credit manager, general manager and loan officer, and provide for compensation for other employes within guidelines predetermined by the board of directors.

(9) Authorize the conveyance of property.

(10) Borrow or lend money to carry on the functions of the credit union.

(11) Designate a depository or depositories for the funds of the credit union.

(12) Suspend any or all members of the credit or supervisory committee for failure to perform their duties.

(13) Appoint any special committees deemed necessary.

(14) Perform such other duties as the members from time to time direct, and perform or authorize any action not inconsistent with ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992 and not specifically reserved by the bylaws for the members.

723.302 Duties of credit committee. The credit committee shall have the general supervision of all loans to members.

723.306 Meetings of credit committee. The credit committee shall meet as often as the business of the credit union requires and not less frequently than once a month to consider applications for loans. No loan shall be made unless it is approved by a majority of the committee who are present at the meeting at which the application is considered.

723.312 Loan officers. (1) The credit committee may appoint one or more loan officers and delegate the power to approve loans, subject to such limitations or conditions as the credit committee prescribes.

723.322 Duties of supervisory committee. (1) The supervisory committee shall make or cause to be made a comprehensive annual audit of the books and affairs of the credit union and shall submit a report of the audit to the board of directors and the superintendent and a summary of that report to the members at the next annual meeting of the credit union. It shall make or cause to be made such supplementary audits or examinations as it deems necessary or as are required by the superintendent or by the board of directors, and submit reports of these supplementary audits to the board of directors.

(2) The supervisory committee shall cause the accounts of the members to be verified with the records of the credit union

from time to time, and not less frequently than every two years.

723.326 Suspension and removal of officials. (1) The supervisory committee by a unanimous vote may suspend any member of the credit committee and shall report such action to the board of directors for appropriate action

(2) The supervisory committee by a unanimous vote may suspend any officer or member of the board of directors until the next members' meeting, which shall be held not less than seven nor more than 21 days after such suspension. At such meeting the suspension shall be acted upon by the members.

(3) Any member of the supervisory committee may be removed by the board of directors for failure to perform his duties in accordance with ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992, the articles of incorporation or bylaws.

SAVINGS ACCOUNTS

723.402 Shares. (1) The capital of a credit union consists of the payments made by members on shares.

(2) Shares may be subscribed to, paid for and transferred in such manner as the bylaws prescribe.

(3) A certificate need not be issued to denote ownership of a share in a credit union.

723.406 Dividends. (1) At such intervals and for such periods as the board of directors may authorize, and after provision for the required reserves, the board of directors may declare dividends to be paid from the undivided earnings at such rates and upon such classes of shares as are determined by the board. Such dividends shall be paid on all paid-up shares outstanding at the close of the period for which the dividend is declared.

(2) Shares which become fully paid up during such dividend period and are outstanding at the close of the period shall be entitled to a proportional share of such dividend.

(3) Dividend credit for a month may be accrued on shares which are or become fully paid up during the first 10 days of that month.

(4) Subject to the approval of the board of directors, accounts closed between dividend periods may be credited with dividends at the rate of the last dividend, computed from the last dividend period to the date when closed.

723.412 Deposits. (1) A credit union may receive savings in deposit accounts from its members, subject to such conditions as the board of directors establishes.

723.426 Joint accounts. (1) A member may designate any person or persons to hold shares, deposits and thrift club accounts with him in joint tenancy with the right of survivorship, but no joint tenant, unless a member in his own right, shall be permitted to vote, obtain loans, or hold office or be required to pay an entrance or membership fee.

(2) Payment of part or all of such accounts to any of the joint tenants shall, to the extent of such payment, discharge the liability to all.

723.432 Trust accounts. (1) Shares may be issued and deposits may be held in the name of a member in trust for a beneficiary, including a minor, but no beneficiary, unless a member in his own right, shall be permitted to vote, obtain loans, hold office or be required to pay an entrance or membership fee.

(2) Payment of part or all of such shares or deposits to such member shall, to the extent of such payment, discharge the liability of the credit union to the member and the beneficiary, and the credit union shall be under no obligation to see to the application of such payment.

(3) In the event of the death of the member, and if shares or deposits are so issued or held and the credit union has been given no other written notice of the existence or terms of any trust, such shares or deposits and any dividends or interest thereon shall be paid to the beneficiary.

723.436 Liens. The credit union shall have a lien on the shares, deposit accounts and accumulated dividends or interest of a member in his individual or joint account, for any sum past due the credit union from said member or for any loan indorsed by him.

723.442 Dormant accounts. (1) If a credit union is unable to contact a member, any of the persons named on a joint account, beneficiary or other person via first class mail at the last address shown on the records of the credit union, and if such inability continues for a period of more than one year, all shares, dividends, deposit accounts, interest and other sums due or standing in the name of such member, beneficiary

or other person may, by action of the board of directors, be credited to the accounts payable of the credit union, and thereafter no dividends or interest will accrue thereto, providing the balance of said account is below \$50.

(2) ORS 98.302 to 98.436, the Uniform Disposition of Unclaimed Property Act, provides for escheat to the State of Oregon of dormant accounts. Such items shall be carried until the period provided by said law has expired, after which items shall be turned over to the State of Oregon.

(1) Whenever the losses of any credit union, resulting from a depreciation in value of its loans or investments or otherwise, exceed its undivided earnings and reserve fund so that the estimated value of its assets is less than the total amount due the shareholders, the credit union may by a majority vote of the entire membership order a reduction in the shares of each of its shareholders to divide the loss proportionately among the members.

(2) If the credit union thereafter realizes from such assets a greater amount than was fixed by the order of reduction, such excess shall be divided proportionately among the shareholders whose assets were reduced, but only to the extent of such reduction.

LOANS

723.502 Purposes; terms; interest rate. A credit union may loan to members for such purpose and upon such security and terms as the credit committee, credit manager or loan officer approves, at rates of interest not exceeding one and one-quarter percent per month on the unpaid monthly balances.

723.532 Loans to officials. (1) A credit union may make loans to its directors, employes, loan officers, credit manager and to members of its supervisory and credit committees, provided that:

(a) The loan complies with all lawful requirements under ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992 with respect to loans to other borrowers and is not on terms more favorable than those extended to other borrowers; and

(b) Any such loan or the combined aggregate amount of such loans may not exceed 10 percent of the paid in an unimpaired capital.

(2) No director, officer, employe or committee member shall be permitted to borrow indirectly or become surety for any loan or advance made by the corporation except for his spouse or minor children.

723.536 Loans to nonmembers; personal liability. Any officer, director or member of a committee of a credit union who knowingly permits a loan to be made or participates in a loan to a nonmember of the credit union shall be primarily liable to the credit union for the amount thus illegally loaned. INSURANCE AND GROUP PURCHASING

723.572 Insurance for members. (1) A credit union may purchase or make available life savings, loan protection and other forms of insurance for its members in amounts related to their respective ages, shares, deposits or loan balances or to any combination of them.

(2) A credit union may enter into cooperative marketing arrangements to facilitate its members' voluntary purchases of disability insurance, accident and health insurance and legal expense insurance.

723.576 Liability insurance for director, officer, employe or agent. A credit union may purchase and maintain insurance on behalf of any person who is or was a director, officer, employe or agent of the credit union, or who is or was serving at the request of the credit union as a director, officer, employe or agent of another corporation, partnership, joint venture, trust or other enterprise against any liability asserted against such person and incurred by such person in any such capacity or arising out of such person's status as such, whether or not the credit union would have the power to indemnify such person against such liability.

723.582 Share and deposit insurance.

(1) Prior to January 1, 1978, a credit union may obtain insurance on shares and deposits from the National Credit Union Administration under the Federal Credit Union Act or its successor, or from such other governmental or private entity as shall be providing such insurance and is approved by the superintendent.

(2) As of January 1, 1978, each credit union shall have obtained insurance on shares and deposits from the National Credit Union Administration under the Federal Credit Union Act or its successor, or from such other governmental or private entity as shall be providing such insurance and is approved by the superintendent.

(3) The superintendent may make available condition and examination reports to the Administrator of the National Credit Union Administration and may accept any report of examination made by such administrator. The superintendent may appoint the Administrator of the National Credit Union Administration as liquidating agent of an insured credit union.

723.586 Group purchasing. A credit union may enter into cooperative marketing arrangements to facilitate its members' voluntary purchases of such goods and services as are in the interest of improving economic and social conditions of the members. Said investment shall not exceed one percent of the credit union's capital. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the taxable income from such activities which are conducted by the credit union shall be subject to tax pursuant to ORS 317.910 to 317.950.

INVESTMENTS

723.602 Investment of funds. Funds not used in loans to members may be invested:

(1) In securities, obligations or other instruments of or issued by or fully guaranteed as to principal and interest by the United States or any agency thereof or in any trust or trusts established directly or collectively in the same.

(2) In obligations of any state of the United States, the agencies or instrumentalities of the Federal Government, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico and the several territories organized by Congress, or any political subdivision thereof.

(3) In certificates of deposit or passbook type accounts issued by a state or national bank, mutual savings bank or savings and loan association.

(4) In loans to or in shares or deposits of other credit unions.

(5) In the capital shares, obligations or preferred stock issues of any agency or

association organized as a stock company, or membership in a mutual association or membership corporation, provided the stockholdings or membership, as the case may be, of such agency or association are primarily confined or restricted to credit unions, or organizations of credit unions, and provided the purposes for which such agency or association is organized are designed primarily to service or otherwise assist credit union operations, not to exceed one percent of assets.

(6) In shares of a credit union cooperative society organized under the laws of this state or of the laws of the United States in the total amount not exceeding one percent of the shares, deposits, and surplus of the credit union.

(7) In loans to any credit union association or corporation, national or state, of which the credit union is a member, except that such investments shall be limited to two percent of the assets of the credit union. [1975 c.652 s.64]

RESERVE ALLOCATIONS

723.632 Transfers to regular reserve.

(1) Immediately before the payment of each dividend, the gross earnings of the credit union shall be determined. From this amount, there shall be set aside sums as a regular reserve for contingencies in accordance with the following schedule:

(a) Ten percent of gross income until the regular reserve equals eight percent of the total of outstanding loans and risk assets; then

(b) Seven percent of gross income until the regular reserve equals nine percent of the total of outstanding loans and risk assets; then

(c) Five percent of gross income until the regular reserve equals 10 percent of the total of outstanding loans and risk assets.

(2) Whenever the regular reserve falls below 10 percent, nine percent, or eight percent of the total of outstanding loans and risk assets, as the case may be, it shall be replenished by regular contributions in such amounts as are needed to maintain the reserve goals of eight percent, nine percent or 10 percent.

(3) Any entrance fees, charges and transfer fees shall, after payment of organization expenses, be added to the regular reserve.

(4) Notwithstanding subsections (1) and (2) of this section, if the member accounts of

the credit union are insured by the Administrator of the National Credit Union Administration, immediately before the payment of each dividend, the gross earnings of the corporation shall be determined, from this amount 10 percent of the gross income shall be carried to the reserve until the regular reserve shall equal seven and one-half percent of the total outstanding loans and risk assets, then five percent of the gross income shall be carried to the reserve until the regular reserve shall equal 10 percent of the total outstanding loans and risk assets. Whenever the regular reserve falls below 10 percent or seven and one-half percent, of the total outstanding loans and risk assets, as the case may be, it shall be replenished by regular contributions in such amounts as may be needed to maintain the regular reserve goals of seven and one-half percent and 10 percent.

723.636 Use of regular reserve. The regular reserve shall belong to the credit union and shall be used to meet losses except those resulting from an excess of expenses over income and shall not be distributed except on liquidation of the credit union, or in accordance with a plan approved by the superintendent.

723.642 Risk assets defined. For the purpose of establishing the reserves required by ORS 723.632 all assets except the following shall be considered risk assets:

(1) Cash on hand.

(2) Deposits and shares in federal or state banks, savings and loan associations and credit unions.

(3) Assets which are insured by, fully guaranteed as to principal and interest by, or due from the Federal Government, its agencies, the Federal National Mortgage Association or the Government National Mortgage Association.

(4) Loans to students insured under the provision of Title IV, Part B of the Higher Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1071 et seq.) or similar state insurance programs.

(5) Loans insured under Title I of the National Housing Act (12 U.S.C. 1703) by the Federal Housing Administration.

(6) Shares or deposits in central credit unions organized under ORS 723.702 to 723.716 or of any other state act or of the Federal Credit Union Act.

(7) Accrued interest on nonrisk investments.

723.646 Special reserves. In addition to such regular reserve, special reserves to protect the interest of members shall be established:

(1) When required by regulation; or

(2) When found by the board of directors of the credit union or by the superintendent (or if the members' accounts are insured by the National Credit Union Administration, the Administrator of the National Credit Union Administration), in any special case, to be necessary for that purpose.

CHANGE IN CORPORATE STATUS

723.672 Suspension. (1) If it appears that any credit union is bankrupt or insolvent, or that it has wilfully violated ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992, or is operating in an unsafe or unsound manner, the superintendent shall issue an order temporarily suspending the credit union's operations for not less than 30 nor more than 60 days. The board of directors shall be given notice by registered mail of such suspension, and a list of the specific violations of ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992.

(2) Upon receipt of such suspension notice, the credit union shall cease all operations, except those authorized by the superintendent. The board of directors shall then file with the superintendent a reply to the suspension notice, and may request a hearing to present a plan of corrective actions proposed if it desires to continue operations. The board may request that the credit union be declared insolvent and a liquidating agent be appointed.

(3) Upon receipt from the suspended credit union of evidence that the conditions causing the order of suspension have been corrected, the superintendent may revoke the suspension notice and permit the credit union to resume normal operations.

(4) If the superintendent, after issuing notice of suspension and providing an opportunity for a hearing, rejects the credit union's plan to continue operations, he may then revoke the credit union's charter, appoint a liquidating agent and liquidate the credit union. The credit union may request the appropriate court to stay execution of

such action. Involuntary liquidation may not be ordered prior to the conclusion of suspension procedures outlined in this section.

(5) If, within the suspension period, the credit union fails to answer the suspension notice or request a hearing, the superintendent may then revoke the credit union's charter, appoint a liquidating agent and liquidate the credit union.

723.676 Liquidation. (1) A credit union may elect to dissolve voluntarily and liquidate its affairs in the manner prescribed in this section.

(2) The board of directors shall adopt a resolution recommending the credit union be dissolved voluntarily and directing that the question of liquidation be submitted to the members.

(3) Within 10 days after the board of directors decides to submit the question of liquidation to the members, the president shall notify the superintendent thereof in writing setting forth the reasons for the proposed action. Within 10 days after the members act on the question of liquidation, the president shall notify the superintendent in writing as to whether or not the members approved the proposed liquidation.

(4) As soon as the board of directors decides to submit the question of liquidation to the members, payment on shares, withdrawal of shares, making any transfer of shares to loans and interest, making investments of any kind and granting loans shall be suspended pending action by members on the proposal to liquidate. On approval by the members of such proposal, all such business transactions shall be permanently discontinued. Necessary expenses of operation shall, however, continue to be paid on authorization of the board of directors or liquidating agent during the period of liquidation.

(5) For a credit union to enter voluntary liquidation, approval by a majority of the members in writing or by a two-thirds majority of the members present at a regular or special meeting of the members is required. Where authorization for liquidation is to be obtained at a meeting of the members, notice in writing shall be given to each member by first class mail to the member's last-known address at least 10 days prior to such meeting.

(6) A liquidating credit union shall continue in existence for the purpose of discharging its debts, collecting and distributing its assets and doing all acts required in order to wind up its business and may sue

and be sued for the purpose of enforcing such debts and obligations until its affairs are fully adjusted.

(7) The board of directors or the liquidating agent shall use the assets of the credit union to pay: First, expenses incidental to liquidating including any surety bond that may be required; and, second, any liability due nonmembers. Assets then remaining shall be distributed to the members proportionately to the shares and deposits held by each member as of the date dissolution was voted.

(8) As soon as the board of directors or the liquidating agent determines that all assets from which there is a reasonable expectancy of realization have been liquidated and distributed as set forth in this section, they shall execute a certificate of dissolution on a form prescribed by the superintendent and file the same, together with all pertinent books and records of the liquidating credit union, the superintendent, whereupon such credit union shall be dissolved.

723.682 Merger. (1) Any credit union chartered and domiciled in this state may, with the approval of the superintendent, merge with another credit union under the existing charter of the other credit union, if domiciled in this state, pursuant to any plan agreed upon by the majority of each board of directors of each credit union joining in the merger, and approved by the affirmative vote of a majority of the members of the merging credit union present at a meeting of its members duly called for such purpose.

(2) After agreement by the directors and approval by the members of the merging credit union, the president and secretary of the credit union shall execute a certificate of merger, which shall set forth all of the following.

(a) The time and place of the meeting of the board of directors at which the plan was agreed upon

(b) The vote in favor of the adoption of the plan.

(c) A copy of the resolution or other action by which the plan was agreed upon.

(d) The time and place of the meeting of the members at which the plan agreed upon was approved.

(e) The vote by which the plan was approved by the members.

(3) Such certificate and a copy of the plan of merger agreed upon shall be forwarded to the superintendent, certified by

him, and returned to both credit unions within 30 days.

(4) Upon return of the certificate from the superintendent, all property, property rights, and members' interest of the merged credit union shall vest in the surviving credit union without deed, indorsement or other instrument of transfer, and all debts, obligations and liabilities of the merged credit union shall be deemed to have been assumed by the surviving credit union under whose charter the merger was affected. The rights and privileges of the members of the merged credit union shall remain intact.

(5) This section shall be construed, whenever possible, to permit a credit union chartered under the laws of any other state or of the United States to merge with one chartered under the laws of this state, or to permit one chartered under the laws of this state to merge with one chartered under the laws of any other state or of the United States, provided such credit unions are domiciled in this state.

723.686 Conversion of charter. (1) A credit union chartered under the laws of this state may be converted to a credit union chartered under the laws of the United States, subject to the approval of the superintendent.

(2) A credit union chartered under the laws of the United States may convert to a credit union chartered under the laws of this state. To effect such a conversion, a credit union must comply with all the requirements of the jurisdiction under which it was originally chartered and the requirements of the superintendent and file proof of such compliance with the superintendent.

CENTRAL CREDIT UNIONS

723.702 Organization, name. Any central credit union may be organized and operated under ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992 and shall be subject to all provisions of ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992 not inconsistent with ORS 723.702 to 723.716. Such credit union shall use the term "central" in its official name.

723.706 Membership. Membership in such central credit union is limited to:

(1) Credit unions organized and operating under ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816

and 723.832 to 723.992 or under any other credit union act.

(2) Officers, directors, committee members and employes of such credit unions; officials and employes of any association of credit unions; and employes of federal or state governmental agencies responsible for the supervision of credit unions in this state; provided, however, the superintendent, his deputies, examiners and other employes of the credit union section, and the Administrator of the National Credit Union Administration, his deputies, examiners and other employes of the National Credit Union Administration, are prohibited from borrowing from credit unions subject to their supervision.

(3) Organizations and associations of those persons or organizations enumerated in subsection (1) or (2) of this section.

(4) Employes of an employer with insufficient numbers to form or conduct the affairs of a separate credit union.

(5) Persons in the field of membership of liquidated credit unions or of credit unions which have entered into or are about to enter into voluntary or involuntary liquidation proceedings.

(6) Members of the immediate families of all members qualified above.

723.712 Voting representative. Each credit union becoming a member of such central credit union may designate one person to be its voting representative in the central credit union, which person shall be designated by the board of directors of the member credit union. Such voting representative shall be eligible to hold office in the central credit union as if such person were himself a member of the central credit union.

723.716 Additional rights and powers. (1) A central credit union shall have all of the rights and powers of any other credit union organized under ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992 and the additional rights and powers specified in this section, notwithstanding any limitations or restrictions found elsewhere in ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992.

(2) A central credit union may make loans to other credit unions, purchase shares of and make deposits in other credit unions and, with the approval of the superintendent, obtain or acquire the assets and liabilities

of any credit union operating in this state which enters into liquidation.

(3) A central credit union may invest in and grant loans to associations of credit unions, central funds of credit unions or organizations chartered to provide service to credit unions.

(4) A central credit union may borrow money from any source. It may also issue debentures pursuant to a plan approved by the superintendent. Such debentures must be subordinate to the deposits and shares of the credit union.

TAXATION

723.752 Application of tax statutes to credit unions. Any credit union subject to ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992 shall be deemed an institution for savings within the meaning of the law which exempts such institutions from taxation. No law, except as stated in this section, which taxes corporations in any form, or the shares thereof or the accumulations therein, shall apply to credit unions doing business in accordance with ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992 unless such credit unions are specifically named in the law. However, credit unions subject to ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992 shall be subject to the same tax as mutual savings and loan associations.

723.756 Stock transfer taxes. The shares of any credit union shall not be subject to stock transfer taxes, either when issued or when transferred from one member to another.

723.762 Participation in government programs. The participation by a credit union in any government program providing unemployment, social security, old age pension or other benefits shall not be deemed a waiver of the taxation exemption hereby granted.

MISCELLANEOUS

723.802 Instruction in schools. With the consent and under the direction of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, the organization, management and extension of

credit unions as set forth in ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992 may be taught in the public schools of this state.

723.806 Notice to Attorney General or district attorney of Oregon Credit Union Act violations; investigations and proceedings. (1) If the superintendent has reason to believe that a person has violated any provision of the Oregon Credit Union Act for which criminal prosecution is provided, he shall give the information relative to the violation to the Attorney General or district attorney having jurisdiction of the violation. The Attorney General or district attorney promptly shall investigate the violation and institute such action against the person as the information and investigation requires or justifies.

(2) The cost of the investigation and action shall be paid by the county or state in the manner in which other criminal actions are paid.

723.812 Actions; assistance. The Attorney General shall conduct all actions begun by the superintendent under authority of the Oregon Credit Union Act, and may require the assistance of the district attorney of the district in which the action is conducted.

723.816 Prohibited acts. (1) No credit union officer, director, employe or agent, shall wilfully:

(a) With intent to deceive, falsify any book of account, report, statement, record or other document of a credit union whether by alteration, false entry, omission or otherwise.

(b) Sign, issue, publish or transmit to a governmental office any book of account, report, statement, record or other document which he knows to be false.

(c) By means of deceit, obtain a signature to a writing which is a subject of forgery.

(d) With intent to deceive, destroy any credit union book of account, report, statement, record or other document.

(2) No person shall maliciously and knowingly spread false reports about the management or finances of any credit union.

723.822 Cease and desist orders. When it appears to the Superintendent of

Banks that a credit union is violating any law or is conducting its business in an unsafe or unauthorized manner, he may, by an order in writing, direct the discontinuance of the illegal, unsafe or unauthorized practices.

723.826 Civil penalties. (1) Any person who:

(a) Violates ORS 723.010 shall forfeit and pay to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the State Banking Fund a civil penalty in an amount determined by the Superintendent of Banks of not more than \$5,000.

(b) Violates ORS 723.130, subsection (4) of 723.380 or subsection (3) of 723.410 or fails to comply with an order under ORS 723.822 shall forfeit a civil penalty in an amount determined by the Superintendent of Banks of not more than \$2,500. In addition, a person who fails to comply with an order under ORS 723.822 shall be discharged from his position with the credit union.

(2) All money forfeited under subsection (1) of this section shall be paid to the State Treasurer to be deposited in the State Banking Fund.

(3) The civil penalty may be recovered in an action brought thereon in the name of the State of Oregon in any court of appropriate jurisdiction.

(4) In any court action with respect to a civil penalty, the court may review the penalty as to both liability and reasonableness of amount.

723.832 Application to credit unions existing on September 13, 1975. The provisions of the Oregon Credit Union Act shall apply to the fullest extent permitted by the laws and Constitutions of the United States and of the State of Oregon, to all existing credit unions organized under any general Act of this state.

723.836 Effect of amendment or repeal of Oregon Credit Union Act. (1) The Oregon Credit Union Act may be amended, repealed or modified, but such amendment, repeal or modification shall not take away or impair any remedy for any liability which shall have been previously incurred.

(2) The repeal of a prior Act by ORS 317.920, 723.002 to 723.816 and 723.832 to 723.992 shall not affect any right accrued or established, or any liability or penalty

incurred, under the provisions of such Act,
prior to the repeal thereof.
